'THE WARRIOR SLEEPS AMONG HIS PEERS'

KING EDWARD UNVEILS THE GREAT MEMORIAL

"All's well, for over there among his peers a happy warrior sleeps," the King quoted—from the inscription at the Memorial Chamber in Ottawa—as he unveiled the commanding monument at Vimy Ridge yesterday. "Those words," he said, "reveal the inner meaning of what we do to-day. . ."

His moving oration was heard in all parts of the Empire and in every British home.

The picture shows the King on the dais making his speech. He was standing close to the great symbolical figure representing Canada's sorrow. This close view reveals the figure in all its deeply impressive beauty; "the inspired expression in stone of Canada's salute to her fallen sons."

She faces the battlefield of Vimy, which, twenty years ago, was pitted with shell craters, and is for ever hallowed by the blood of Canadian heroes. To-day green fields have covered the scars of war.
